

AT THE ORANGE OVAL.

Montclair Team Beaten by Home Players 10 to 0.

ORANGE, N. J., Oct. 2.—The Orange Athletic Club opened its football season at the Orange Oval this afternoon in a game of two fifteen-minute halves with the Montclair Athletic Club team. The visitors were considerably lighter than the Orange men, but they succeeded in holding the home team down to ten points. Both teams showed need of practice, especially in defensive work. The Orange men played with comparatively little snap, and fumbling was frequent. In the first half neither side scored.

In the second half Mohor kicked off for Orange, who soon got the ball again on downs, and Offenheimer plunged through the centre for ten yards, and a moment later, after some mass plays, crossed the goal line and touched down. Mohor kicked the goal. Time, 6½ minutes. Kearns kicked off for the visitors, but Stephens went through the left end for ten yards, followed by Shields through the centre for as many more. Brown also made some short gains. Offenheimer again crossed the goal line and touched down without the visitors having felt of the ball since the last scoring. Mohor failed at goal. Orange had almost succeeded in scoring again, and the pigskin was on the Montclair's ten-yard line when the game ended.

In the second half Dailey of Montclair broke the third finger of his right hand and stopped playing.
