

HENRY STETSON DEAD.

Hat Manufacturer Had Three Times
Been Mayor of Orange.

ORANGE, N. J., March 15.—Word was received in Orange to-night of the death in Atlantic City early this evening of Henry Stetson, who was thrice Mayor of Orange. He had been in failing health for three years, and on Saturday went to Atlantic City for a change of air. Pneumonia set in.

Mr. Stetson was forty-eight years old, a son of Napoleon Stetson and nephew of John B. Stetson, hat manufacturer of Philadelphia, and was President of the Nonome Hat Manufacturing Company, Orange, one of the largest houses in the country. He was a member of Union Lodge, F. and A. M., the Orange Board of Trade, and the Orange Club. His body will be sent home to-morrow. He leaves a wife and a son, Stephen.

Obituary Notes.

CORYDON E. WHITNEY, a well known newspaper writer, died at his home in Susquehanna, N. Y., Tuesday, at the age of 53. He was known for his witty contributions to newspapers and magazines.

COL. M. J. BURKE, United States Consul at St. Thomas, Ontario, died there yesterday from pneumonia. He had been Consul there since 1897. He was a native of Carleton County, near Ottawa, but came to the States at an early age, and engaged in newspaper work. His last journalistic work was on the Chicago Inter-Ocean. He was forty-eight years of age.

WILLIAM J. RAAB died at his residence, in Bloomfield, on Tuesday night. He was born in Bavaria, Germany, sixty-seven years ago, and came to the United States in 1853. He was in the hotel business for thirty-six years. He was an organizer of the Essex County Building and Loan Association. He served in the civil war in the Eleventh New York Regiment. Mr. Raab was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church. A widow and seven children survive him.
